
New job and internship website connects alumni, students

publication or an invitational exhibition within the past two years. Forty-seven percent of these undergraduate faculty had a refereed publication or an invitation or a solo exhibition at a regional center within the past two years. And 60 percent of college, full-time undergraduate faculty have presented within

their discipline in the past two years (with 28 percent presenting outside their discipline).

Roger Kugel '70, Ph.D., associate vice president for academic affairs, said, "Our dedication to our discipline is strong, and I believe that this translates to a contagious enthusiasm in the classroom that students can't help but absorb."

Goodbye historic Cotter Hall

Cotter Hall, once known as La Salle Hall and the Beck House, was destroyed by fire during the early hours of Monday, June 12.

Staring at the pile of bricks, we couldn't help but reflect back about what was — an impressive mansion fit for an affluent businessman, as well as Bishop Heffron, the founder of Saint Mary's; a home for Christian Brothers and those who were studying to become Brothers; a residence hall for a group of young men whose laughter frequently filled the floors; and a home for Sisters of great help to the college.

But we also mourn what might have been. The potential for the building, its carved stairway, its monstrous arched doorways, and its marble fireplace, was tremendous. As a university, we mourn its destruction. Read more about this historic building in this issue.

A representation of faculty and administrators from each of the seven Lasallian colleges and universities in North America came together at Saint Mary's in June to discuss their common Lasallian mission.

SMU hosts seven Lasallian colleges for conference

On June 9-10, Saint Mary's University of Minnesota hosted a higher education regional conference titled, "Together and By Association." For the first time, a representation of faculty and administrators from each of the seven Lasallian colleges and universities in North America came together to discuss their common Lasallian mission, the legacy of the 17th century French founder of the Brothers of the Christian Schools, Saint John Baptist de La Salle.

Invited participants discussed successes, challenges, and best practices in promoting the Lasallian educational mission, specifically within colleges and universities. Brother President Craig J. Franz, FSC, Ph.D., was the keynote speaker. Brother Craig is also the president of the International Association of Lasallian Universities.

This conference was made possible by a grant from the Lilly Fellows Program in Humanities and the Arts, secured by SMU faculty members Jane Kelley Rodeheffer, Ph.D., Judith K. Schaefer, O.P., Ph.D., and Mary Catherine Fox '75, M.S.'89, Ph.D. The Lilly Fellows Program funds regional conferences focused on mission for religiously affiliated colleges and universities.

Brother Louis DeThomasis co-authors book

In their newly released book, *Doing Right in a Shrinking World: How Corporate America Can Balance Ethics & Profit in a Changing Economy*, authors Brother Louis DeThomasis, FSC, Ph.D., chancellor and president emeritus of Saint Mary's University, and Neal St. Anthony, a business

columnist of the Minneapolis Star Tribune, say being ethical is a myth; but they explain how doing ethics is what really counts.

"We focus on doing ethics in a profit-driven world economy and show the reader how ethics and profit can coexist," Brother Louis said.

The authors pose: Is ethical agreement possible in a multicultural world? Do religions help or hinder businesses to do ethics? How do America's CEOs tackle ethical issues?

Brother Louis says, "Alone, the golden rule, religious tenets, and other static belief systems are no longer viable options in our ever-changing world. With the diverse cultures, religions, and organizations in our global economy, we must continuously adapt to

unique situations and make decisions that benefit all people.

It is important to frame business ethics not as a higher calling or a legal minimum requirement, say the authors, but as a realistic tool for increasing profit. The authors offer solutions to spread wealth and improve the quality of life and human rights worldwide.

Doing Right in a Shrinking World reveals a new perspective that will help organizations balance ethics with profit, and do away with the idea that businesses should apologize for seeking increased wealth. The authors introduce executives who embrace cultural differences and proceed with imagination, faith, and commitment to doing ethics in today's rapidly changing, pluralistic economy.

Brother Louis is also a senior fellow of the Hendrickson Institute for Ethical Leadership, a Saint Mary's University affiliate organization on the Winona campus that sponsors special events, speakers and other educational programming for students and the community that emphasize the integration of ethical principles, morals, spirituality and free enterprise.

Fire destroys historic house at Saint Mary's

n Monday, June 12, 2006, fire destroyed the historic Beck House, also known as La Salle Hall — and most recently Cotter Hall — on the Winona campus of Saint Mary's University.

If these walls could only speak. There's no end to the stories the historic mansion could tell, first of housing an affluent civic and business leader and his family, then Bishop Heffron, the founder of Saint Mary's. And then of watching as the university – not to mention the town of Winona – built up around its perch atop Terrace Heights at the outskirts of town.

Inside its walls were also the hopes and aspirations of young Christian Brothers and those studying to become Brothers, who continue to spread the Lasallian mission, to further education and aid humanity in all portions of the world.

And the walls once rocked with the laughter from practical jokes that took place inside when it served as a dormitory for the then college. The Cotter Rats — a group of alumni featured in the fall 2004 magazine — made lifelong friendships inside those walls.

Since 1990, Cotter Hall stood empty of people and housed excess desks and chairs, serving as storage for the university.

From time to time people called out for the building to be restored. And,

ironically, sadly, that time may have come. Brother President Craig Franz had recently met with an architect to discuss the possibility of its restoration.

But it was not meant to be.

The cause of the fire remains under investigation by the state fire marshal.

As Greg Gaut, '69, J.D., Ph.D., professor of history and local historian, said, "It's like losing an old friend."

The History

The mansion was built between 1876 and 1877. The architect was C.G. Maybury, who also designed the Winona County Court House and a number of other important buildings in southern Minnesota including Saint Stanislaus Church, the Laird-Norton building, and the octagon house of Lafayette Street in Winona. Conrad Bohn & Co. completed the mill work in the interior. A recent architectural survey had declared the structure architecturally significant.

The Charles Christian Beck mansion was built on a bluff overlooking the mouth of Gilmore Valley. The land at the bottom of this bluff had been cultivated

by generations of Eastern Dakota and was the primary agricultural site of Wabasha's village. During Minnesota's territorial stage, this land was cultivated by the Eastern Dakota people under the direction of James Reed who was appointed Indian farmer to Chief Wabasha's band in 1842 (nine years prior to the opening of Minnesota Territory to settlement).

C.C. Beck was an influential entrepreneur. He was a brewer,

businessman, and local politician. In addition to his farm in Gilmore Valley, Beck built the Gilmore Valley Brewery and a large building in downtown Winona in which he conducted a hardware business. He also served as a director of

Merchant's National Bank.
The most significant resident of this

house was Patrick R. Heffron, second bishop of Winona (1910-1927). Heffron chose this home over the former bishop's residence on the College of Saint Teresa campus. Upon his return from Rome in 1911, Heffron made the house on Terrace Heights the headquarters of the Diocese of Winona, as well as his residence. This house was the Episcopal Office of the Diocese of Winona from 1911 until 1933. It was here Bishop Heffron founded the institutions which became a part of the Winona diocese. He expanded the Catholic school system, and instituted the Winona Plan for Parochial Schools, which sought to achieve the standards set by the Minnesota State Department of Education. He instituted the Courier, a monthly newspaper. Heffron was the only bishop in the archdiocese who established his own newspaper instead of adopting the Catholic Bulletin as the official organ of his diocese. In 1910, he used this newspaper to announce the founding of a boys' college which became Saint Mary's College/University.

One of the Mayo doctors performed emergency surgery in this house in 1915, attending to Heffron's gunshot wounds after a failed assassination attempt.

The Christian Brothers came to Winona in 1911 to operate Cotter High School. The Brothers' initial institutional appearance on Terrace Heights occurred in 1926 when the first of many annual retreats was held at Saint Mary's College. This association of the Brothers and the diocesan college developed into an agreement for the Brothers to purchase the college from the diocese. In 1933 the institution became a Christian Brothers' college. Shortly

and brewery of C.C. Beck.

thereafter the Christian Brothers Senior Scholasticate was transferred from Chicago to the college and located in the former bishop's residence, renamed La Salle Hall. The Scholasticate remained in this building from 1934 to 1941. North Central Accreditation of Saint Mary's College in 1937 as a four-year liberal arts college enhanced the status of the Scholasticate and provided the Brothers a college education which increased the demand for their teaching services throughout the St. Louis District. From 1941 to 1949, the building was a residence for the Christian Brothers.

Fifty brothers lived and studied in this building when it was a Scholasticate. Many of the outstanding teachers of the college lived in this house, including Brother Charles Severin, Brother H. Raphael Erler '38, Brother Robert Lane '37, Brother Leonard Courtney, Brother Urban Lucken '35, Brother Michael Kump '36, and Brother Paul Ostendorf '53. Three of these residents became presidents of the college, Brothers Joel Nelson, Gregory Robertson '39 and George Pahl '36.

For 15 years, 1950-1965, the former mansion was a student dormitory named Cotter Hall. Among the hall counselors (or "night watchmen" as they called themselves) were Brothers Leonard Courtney, Urban Lucken, H. Raphael Erler, Regis Ridgeway '42, Raymond "Shorty" Long '43 and Joel Nelson. An exceptional and beloved member of the faculty and a member of the Preservation Committee, Arthur Flodstrom '64, was one of the student residents of Cotter Hall.

From 1965 to 1972, Cotter Hall was the residence of the Hermanas Sisters, whose religious vocation was to do the work no one wanted to do.

A group of Brothers — including

Paul Grass '57 and Steven Markham '66

established a community of students and Brothers in Cotter Hall in the fall of 1972. Brother Paul Ostendorf '53 was the director of Brother Candidates

and Brothers Robert Smith '76 and Pat Conway '75 were student candidates. Brother Paul Grass became a devoted follower of auctions and estate sales to secure period furniture and artifacts for Cotter Hall. He also became a premier wood restorer. The faculty Christmas party/open house at beautifully furnished and decorated Cotter Hall was the highlight of the social season. In 1990, the Brothers merged with St. Yon's Brothers Community.

The Native-American era of the Mdewakantonwan Dakota, the pioneer and dynamic town building years of the city of Winona, and the Diocese of Winona/Christian Brothers presence are three strands of Winona and Saint Mary's University of Minnesota history that were brought together in this historic house. It was here that Bishop Heffron's vision was fulfilled.

Saint Mary's is 1st Minnesota private university to adopt Tegrity technology

Saint Mary's University of Minnesota and Tegrity Campus have entered into a three-year agreement to deploy Tegrity's innovative new technology at SMU. It's the first such arrangement between a private university in Minnesota and Tegrity Campus.

This fall, 25 faculty members will use Tegrity in 54 "wired" classes at the Winona campus.

Now Winona boasts two higher education institutions with this cutting-edge technology. Minnesota State College-Southeast Technical adopted Tegrity Campus approximately a year ago. SMU began a pilot program with four faculty members from its Winona and Twin Cities campuses last winter.

Kevin Black, a junior accounting major at SMU, used the technology in his intermediate accounting class as part of the pilot program.

He remembers the demonstration as impressive but admits he was skeptical.

"Being totally honest, I definitely had doubts at how effective this program was going to be at helping me learn the information being taught," he said.

But Black said once he got used to using the tools, his skepticism disappeared. "I found myself relating to what the students on the demonstration video had to say about it," he said. "Tegrity allowed me to follow what the teacher had to say without worrying about writing down notes the entire class period. I had a sense of security that if I didn't understand what the teacher was saying at the time, I could go back and listen to what the teacher was trying to explain."

How it works

We've come a long way from chalk boards and overhead projectors.

Through Tegrity, faculty record audio and video from their classroom lectures, and capture other digital presentations (PowerPoint, web pages, photos, etc.). The lectures, presentations and any additional content are accessible to students after class through Saint Mary's course-management system, BlackBoard.



Joe Shields, Ph.D., School of Math and Science was one of the faculty members who used Tegrity in a pilot program during the 2005-06 academic year. This year 25 faculty members in 54 classes will use the technology. During class, Saint Mary's students can use a Tegrity Pen or Tablet PC to digitally capture their handwritten notes. Outside of class, students can then use Tegrity Notes software to quickly and easily synchronize the class recording to their notes — maximizing available study time and making class time available on-demand, around the clock.

With Tegrity, students can benefit from an enriched study experience at home, in the computer labs or even — using an iPod — on the go.

"I thought Tegrity was unbelievable at how it used video and audio portion of the lecture for an efficient review.

"I used Tegrity the most to clarify my notes," Black said. "When I studied for my tests, I found it very helpful to refer back to my Tegrity notes on my computer to better understand what the teacher was talking about.

"If there was an overhead my teacher used, or a diagram he drew on the board that I didn't want to copy down in my notes, I would just refer back to it on my personal computer when studying for the test. If the teacher said something I didn't understand I would just "star" that area in my notes to remind myself that this is something I need to go over before the test. (This kept me from worrying the rest of the class period about that one thing I couldn't understand.)"

Tegrity, a great tool for students, will benefit SMU teachers as well.
"Tegrity allows faculty great flexibility in

teaching techniques and allows students to choose from a variety of powerful learning and study tools," said Chad Kjorlien, Ed.D., instructional technology director.

To better serve their technology teaching needs, about one-fourth of faculty on the Winona campus will be receiving new tablet PCs this fall as well.



Sometimes in life there are happy accidents.

Around 1995-96 Brother Roderick Robertson, FSC '63, got a new computer with a new version of Illustrator. He began experimenting with a photo.

"I said, 'Gee, I wonder if I can crash this computer if I keep rotating this," he said.

The computer didn't crash, and these experiments turned into a new art form he calls mandalas, a kaleidoscope of color, intertwining old and historical photos with a modern, computergenerated medium.

They're called Giclee prints, which is French for ink jet. Brother Rod believes everything sounds better in French.

His work began before there were "layers" and a "history palette" in his computer program.

"It wasn't Las Vegas," he said.
"There were no bells and whistles back then."

Brother Rod has collected old photos, ones of his family, himself as a young boy, and other historical photos — "pictures of people I can use and nobody's going to come after me (for photo rights)," he joked.

He calls it "recycling photos."

"I feel it's a shame that these wonderful images are stuck in shoe boxes on the top shelf of a closet," he writes in his website, www.roderickrobertson.com. "I want to save these old photos and make beautiful striking new images from them."

Brother Rod demonstrates the process, building gradient layer upon layer. The transformation of children, stoically dressed in black, no smile upon their faces, into an artistic circus for the eyes, is fascinating. Other inspirations have been a boy on a skateboard or even a ukulele player.

But Brother Rod's students aren't always so impressed.

"I feel it's a shame that these wonderful images are stuck in shoe boxes on the top shelf of a closet ... I want to save these old photos and make beautiful striking new images from them "

"I teach them how to do this, and they're just bored," he said with a laugh.

However, some students really get into using old family photos and following in Brother Rod's footsteps, manipulating something historical and – using techniques like scanning, archiving, retouching and cropping, hand coloring and combining photos – turning them into something new and creative.

They're the ones that get it.

Through the years Brother Rod says he's created 100 mandalas, but after leafing through his large collection of CDs, it appears he may be underestimating.

"Some are more successful than others; there are a few I don't want to talk about," he joked.

It takes between 10 to 20 hours to complete a piece, many of which can be seen on his website.

The mandalas, he said, also are similar to rose windows; the circular pattern lends itself to a religious feel. They also happen to be the perfect shape for CD covers.

You could say Brother Rod has been going around in circles for the past 10 years. But it's no accident. ✓ ■

A. ERIC HEUKESHOVEN

The Historic Winona Steam Calliope, played by A. Eric Heukeshoven, doesn't exactly sneak its way into parades.

"You can't ignore it," Heukeshoven said with a smirk. "We're best heard a quarter of a mile away."

In fact, some people, cupping their hands over their ears, have asked (or yelled) at Heukeshoven to turn it down. But the calliope, essentially an organ on wheels, powered by high-pressured steam, doesn't have a volume control.

At 106 decibels inside the cab, Heukeshoven knows that all too well. It's not often a keyboardist has to wear protective gear during a performance, but Heukeshoven wears two sets of hearing protection, custom-fitted ear plugs and rifle range headphones.

"The calliope's job, with the circus and on the steamboats as well, is to call attention to itself, to announce the circus' (or boat's) arrival," he explained. "It's merely doing its job."

Heukeshoven has played the calliope for 10 years; he took over for his predecessor, Denny Martin, who passed away suddenly.

He'd filled in once for Martin during a local parade.

When they asked him to sub, Heukeshoven agreed instantly. When they asked him if he wanted to practice, Heukeshoven admits he was a bit naïve. "I said, 'It's a keyboard, right?" "But when he pushed on the keys, nothing happened.

Ed Maus, the licensed boiler operator who owns the four Belgian horses and the 1927 antique truck that pulls the calliope, explained to Heukeshoven that he'd have to push a little harder. He wasn't kidding. Heukeshoven found that playing the calliope was quite an upper body workout.

Within 10 blocks Heukeshoven said he was worn out.

Now he's prepared. He wears finger-tip Band-Aids and puts splints on his wrists – as well as takes an Aleve

tablet – if he knows he'll be playing for a longer event. And he drinks lots of water

Yet Heukeshoven is happy to continue playing the calliope for 12 to 15 events a year, including the New Orleans Mardi Gras Parade, because "it's an unbelievably unique thing."

They're guessing Winona's calliope came from the 1930s; there are less than a dozen working, steam-powered circus calliopes in the country.

"You literally see you're having an effect on people who are watching and listening, dancing and smiling," he said. "In New Orleans last year we brought some much-needed joy."

Some of Heukeshoven's favorite tunes include "When You're Smiling," and "When the Saints Go Marching In." But he modifies his show to his audience. If he sees someone walking a dog, he'll shift into "How Much is That Doggy in the Window?".


With only 32 notes to work with, it's a challenge. And the big pipes take a long time to fill with steam, so there's a delay between when he pushes on the keys to when the sound comes out. "It's a little like playing in two time zones," he joked.

And there's the danger factor.

Heukeshoven remembers a time when the pressure began to build, the emergency valve got stuck, and the coach started shaking during a local parade. Heukeshoven yelled, "I think it's going to blow." Maus hit the valve with a pipe wrench and sooty water shot out over the back, raining over the calliope's accompanying Dixieland band. Luckily, no one was hurt.

Heukeshoven shrugged. "It's the only instrument I play that may explode," he said. 🐔

Long before "Lord of the Dance" or "Riverdance" stomped on stage with glitz and glamour, Dr. Flanagan said Irish Dancing used to be "nerdy."

But Dr. Flanagan's aunt and grandfather taught her the jig when she was a fifth-grader. Living in the suburbs of Chicago, she sharpened her skills by taking lessons in the city.

Chicagoans celebrate their Irish heritage.

Moving from a city — where they dye the river Green for Saint Patrick's Day and host a huge parade with shamrock-filled floats — to Winona was a culture shock. She found that many Winonans didn't even recognize the holiday.

"For me Saint Patrick's Day, Christmas and my birthday were the three biggest holidays," she said. "When I moved (to Winona) I thought, 'The nerve of people scheduling things on Saint Patrick's Day that had nothing to do with the Irish or Ireland.'"

So Dr. Flanagan decided to bring a wee bit o' the Irish to a town of primarily Polish, German and Scandinavian descent.

She began teaching Irish dance 34 years ago, back when other SMU faculty members inquired about her instructing their children. Back then there were a handful of students learning the steps in someone's basement.

In 1976, the Irish Dancing Commission in Dublin certified her as an Irish dance instructor. And she completed her doctural dissertation about the history and promotion of Irish music and dance in Chicago in 1995, when "Riverdance" made it big and interest in Irish dance was renewed.

The Flanagan School of Irish Dance has grown to between 40 and 45 students, ages 5 to 19. Throughout the school year, they rehearse once a week. They focus more on performance than competition, entertaining at local senior centers, parish events, school events,

and ethnic celebrations. They travel to the Minnesota Irish Fair and other local fairs as well.

Prior to a summer performance, her Irish dancers rehearsed in the back of a school cafeteria. Dr. Flanagan quickly called out commands like "hop 2-3" and "down 2-3" to her students as she kept tempo to music playing in her head. The dancers, dressed in ornately embroidered black and green dresses, stepped impressively in unison — even the little ones.

"When you look back, it's enjoyable to see their progress," she said.

During their hard-shoe dances, the clack of their shoes made a fast-paced rhythm.

The girls had a look of concentration on their faces. "We're still working on getting them to smile," Dr. Flanagan said.

People sign their children up for lessons simply for the performing and dance experience — as well as the increased stage presence and confidence the dancers receive. Most people on her roster don't even have Irish last names any more. It seems Irish dancing is fun, no matter what your ethnic background.

At SMU, Dr. Flanagan has also taught one Ceili class a semester since the early 1990s.

It's exciting for Dr. Flanagan to pass her passion for Irish dance to new generations. She is now teaching her grandchildren — a guarantee that the Flanagans will be Irish dancing long into the future. ✓



Scott Deml and Jeff Hefel have, ad nausium, and on-air.

"We decided the eye would be better, although the lettuce had its merits; it would be a handy snack," Deml said.

For four years the duo have delighted, bewildered and elicited groans from their listeners through their weekly radio show on the campus radio station, KSMR. The duo can be heard on 92.5-FM on the Saint Mary's campus and 94.3-FM in Winona. Their regular show plays from 3 to 5 p.m. Thursdays.

How many people listen? They boast between one ... and 2 billion listeners.

But really, it wouldn't matter; they admit they're in it for the self-amusement. The two of them crack each other up continuously, until they hold their sides in pain.

At one point, the two held fictional cage matches between various departments and would take on-air callers hedging bets, for example, on who would win between the math and English departments. "We had to end it; it was drawing away from us talking about ourselves," Hefel said with a laugh.

Deml and Hefel also enjoy tricking audiences with a "Name That Tapped Object" game. To date only one student has won. The object, a stapler; the glorious prize, a Banquet TV dinner, and an invitation to dine with the SMU business department faculty.

The two play mostly '70s music, expanding upon their usual lineup of Jimmy Buffett and Elton John songs.

And the two have lent their talent to Gaslight and the faculty talent show, as well as a Katrina Relief fundraiser on campus.

And annually they put their antics toward a good cause; this past year they raised \$1,400 for Habitat for Humanity, far surpassing their \$500 total last year.

The fundraiser continues as the SMU community is taking laminated photos of Scott and Jeff (similar to Flat-Stanley) on vacation with them for \$5. From New York to China, Flat Scott and Flat Jeff are seeing the world this year.

The project is going well. They don't take up much room in a suitcase, are good-looking travel companions and — for once — they're quiet.

Phil Cochran '77, Ph.D., calmly walked across campus as Bonnie the Boa Constrictor coiled around his arm, her head pointed determinedly toward the grass, and her tongue wriggling.

The funny thing about Bonnie, he says with a chuckle, is that she (at least he's pretty sure it's a she) was donated by a parent whose son was going away to school. She was kept in a lab at a college in DePere, Wis., where the Green Bay Packers offensive linemen train in classroom sessions. The team of burly football players was a little squeamish about having Bonnie nearby. And at that point, she was considerably smaller than her current 6-foot stretch. So when Dr. Cochran returned for a visit, he was strongly encouraged to bring Bonnie back with him to Saint Mary's.

Since he was a young boy, Dr. Cochran curiously investigated the area near his home for all forms of animals, reptiles and amphibians.

"I always had pet frogs in pickle jars," he said.

A career biologist who has primarily focused on fisheries (specifically the biology of lampreys), Dr. Cochran additionally labels himself "a closet herpetologist."

For those of us who are unfamiliar with what a herpetologist is, it's someone who studies reptiles and amphibians. And his favorites are rattlesnakes, a threatened species in Minnesota, protected, but still poached for their skins, rattles and for captive specimens.

Dr. Cochran serves on a committee organized by the Department of Natural Resources that monitors rattlesnakes and strives to minimize their contact with people.

And in his spare time, Dr. Cochran monitors the seasonal events of the rattlesnake's life, when they go in and out of dens to hibernate, when they give birth — all in an effort to help protect them. Gone are the days (as

recently as 1989) when there was a bounty on rattlers in Winona.

Dr. Cochran is also part of a rattlesnake responder program. If people find a rattler in their garage or back yard, volunteers like Dr. Cochran will come and get it and return it to its natural habitat.

"They're relatively mild-mannered," he said. "We use a hook; the risk is not all that great. There's no doubt a lot of people will go out of their way to kill them, and they don't have to do that."

Dr. Cochran also helped organize the Timber Rattlesnake Biology and Conservation in the Upper Mississippi River Valley Symposium at SMU Sept. 24, 2005.

In general, he agrees that snakes often get a bum rap.

In the basement of the science building, a new color photograph has been hung in the hallway, donated by a professional photographer who participated in the symposium. Pictured is a larger-than-life snake curled in a circle, its scales perfectly in focus.

Dr. Cochran occasionally sees students recoil away from the photo as if it would come alive.

For Dr. Cochran, snakes are "a symbol of the wild," one that should be appreciated and respected.

Jim Vogel, Ph.D., admits it's not the most relaxing of hobbies, watching countless hours of work, as well as money, soaring high in the sky — and without a parachute.

The wrong wind, a glitch in the mechanics, a rookie at the controls, and it could crash into a crumpled heap.


Since Dr. Vogel's been building radio-controlled model airplanes, a hobby that began in 1979, he can't guess how many planes he's owned.

"What's a synonym for lots?" he said laughing. He mentally calculated that he's owned about 40 aircraft. "Some have crashed," he said, adding with a smile, "But most of them have not."

At least one of the full-scale planes he reproduced into an intricate third-scale model hasn't been as lucky. Dr. Vogel emulates his planes after real ones, particularly stunt planes like one flown by Sean Tucker, the world aerobatic champion.

This April Tucker crashed his beloved Oracle Challenger aerobatic biplane after he experienced a mechanical failure. Luckily Tucker bailed out and was not injured.

Tucker shed a few tears to lose his "lady," a beautiful red plane with white decals. Hearing the news, Dr. Vogel felt as though he'd lost a friend as well.

Dr. Vogel has photographs of Tucker next to the Oracle Challenger and Dr. Vogel next to his smaller version. Every detail – every decal – was copied to perfection.

In fact, in some shots, taken at ground level, any casual observer might mistake Dr. Vogel's models for full-size.

Even the pilot inside, often modeled to look like Dr. Vogel, complete with a beard, looks as though he could give a wave or a thumbs-up at any moment.

Dr. Vogel is a member of the Winona Aeromodelers and just completed his second presidency. For 20 years (up until this year) the club put on a yearly airshow at the local airport — just like a real air show, only smaller.

He's been interested in flight — eagles soaring, airplanes, and model aircraft — since he was "a little young whippersnapper."

He began with the rubber-bandpowered models, and they escalated in complexity, effort and price from there.

But, he admits, that maiden voyage, he said, can be a little nervewracking. "You're never quite sure what your aircraft will do."





RECORDS: 8-8-0 MIAC, 9-14-1 Overall **BRIEFLY:** Senior Marcus Reszka (Winona) and sophomore Adam Gill (Rochester, Minn.) were named to the All-MIAC team. ... 

By day, she conducts analysis of software and website systems to make sure they're user-friendly.

But by night "friendly" isn't even in her

She leaves behind her business clothes for a mini skirt, fish-net stockings, a helmet and a mean pair of skates. As the crowds chant "faster, faster, kill, kill," she takes on her alter ego, "Head Trauma," for the Minnesota RollerGirls in Minneapolis.

Donnelly, who played hockey in a club league at Saint Mary's, was looking for another physical sport she could elbow her way into. Under her leadership, the all-female roller derby league formed in January 2005.

For Donnelly, it's about her team – which also consists of her two sisters – and the camaraderie she gets from being in the derby. Women of all walks of life, ones Donnelly said she wouldn't otherwise have met, share a love for the contact sport.

And, she admits, the danger, the fast skating, hard hits and great skills is a draw to her; though she wouldn't consider herself tough. She'd rather label herself adventurous.

With a fan base of 2-year-olds to 80-year-olds, Head Trauma — and the other girls like Rolls Wilder, Dee Dee Monic and Hanna Belle Lector — do it all for fun. No one gets paid in this volunteer organization; all net proceeds are donated to various local charities.
